This is the seventh edition of the Socio Economic Update; a regular e-bulletin which has been designed to keep you up-to-date with recently released socio-economic reports of reference to policy and planning in the Western Isles. The socio-economic information is listed under topic headings.

Population and Migration

In-migration Required to Stabilize Population

In February 2006, the Outer Hebrides Migration Study was launched. The study, undertaken by Hall Aitken Consultancy, was commissioned to investigate the dynamics of migration and population change as it affects the 'Outer Hebrides'.

The study highlights the important role that migration will play in determining the future sustainability of our island populations. The report proposes a number of policy recommendations to combat depopulation; by encouraging in-migration, stemming out-migration and strengthening our island communities.

The overall aim of the research was to identify the causes, key drivers and socio-economic impacts of population change and to propose evidenced based solutions for a 'sustainable' Outer Hebrides population.

An inter-agency strategy group is being formed to progress the reports recommendations and develop a joint action plan to tackle the challenges ahead.

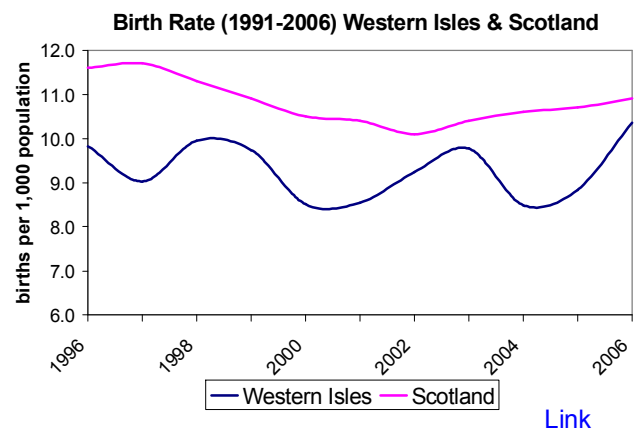
Most Popular Names, 2006

Preliminary Returns 2006

The General Register Office for Scotland has released provisional figures for vital events registered during 2006. Key findings for the Western Isles include:

- There were 273 births in 2006, giving a birth rate of 10.4 per 1,000 popn (national average 10.9). This is considerably higher than previous years.
- There were 336 deaths in 2006, giving a death rate of 12.7 per 1,000 popn. (national average 10.8).



Strategy for an Ageing Population

By 2031 the number of people aged over 50 is projected to increase by 28% and 75% for over 75s.

The Scottish Executive has recently launched a long term strategy entitled "All Our Futures: Planning for a Scotland with an Ageing Population". The strategy outlines the opportunities and choices available to people as they get older.

The Executive has allocated £27 million of funding to support the strategy. This includes the establishment of a National Forum on Ageing and a new Scottish Centre for Intergenerational Practice. Additional funding of £14 million in 2007/08 will be made on fuel poverty programmes and an additional £10m has also been allocated to help homeowners adapt their homes to meet changing needs. Unemployment Update

The latest release from NOMIS (Office for National Statistics) gives the following unemployment rates for February 2007:

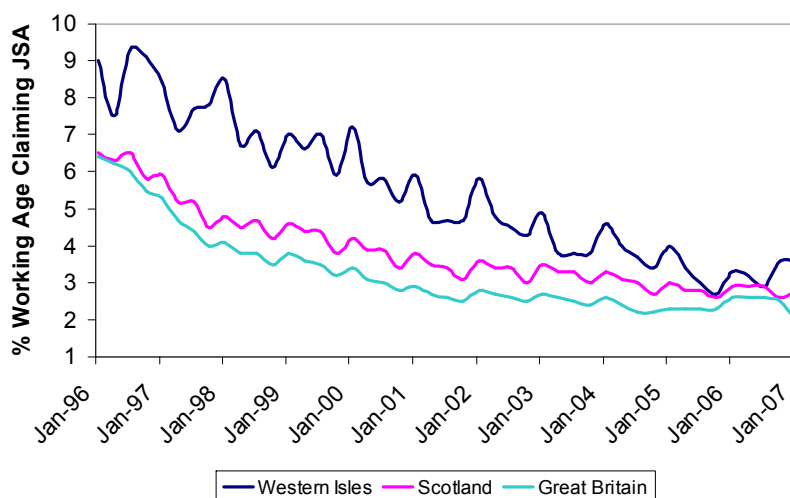
Western Isles	3.8%
Scotland	2.8%
Great Britain	2.6%

This represents a slight increase on previous months (3.6% in October 2006).

As the adjacent graph indicates, over the last ten years we can see that the unemployment rate in the Western Isles has fallen from a high of 9.3% in July 1996 to a low of 2.7% in October 2005.

The February release of the SNS website includes updated hospital admissions data at data zone level and new maternity data (from 2001 to 2005). Life expectancy at birth appears for the first time ever (from 1999 to 2005) and new home care data (2006).

Focus on: ALCOHOL

One indicator which the Western Isles seems to score particularly high in is the 'alcohol related hospital discharge rate' (standardised for age differences); the rate per 10,000 popn for Western Isles (156) was higher than the Scotland rate (75).

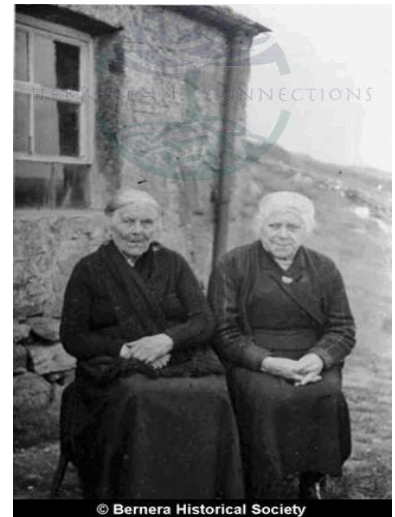

From the Archive: *Extract from 1871 Census*

For interest: below is an extract from the 1871 Census discussing social issues in the Western Isles. 'Gender Imbalance' and the 'Gaelic language' are topics of debate, with a number of radical solutions being suggested.

What to do with the excess of females left in the Mainland-Rural and Insular-Rural Districts is a question of the utmost importance in social economics. It is quite apparent from these statistics that female emigration should be encouraged to a much greater extent, both to our Colonies and larger Towns. But a formidable barrier to the emigration of females to our Towns exists in the fact that over a great portion of the north and west of Scotland, and all the Western Isles, the Gaelic language is still encouraged, and the Population are cut off from emigrating to the Towns from a want of knowledge of the English tongue. The Gaelic language may be what it likes, both as to antiquity and beauty, but it decidedly stands in the way of the civilisation of the natives making use of it, and shuts them out from the paths open to their fellow-countrymen who speak the English tongue. It ought, therefore, to cease to be taught in all our national schools; and as we are one people, we should have but ONE language.



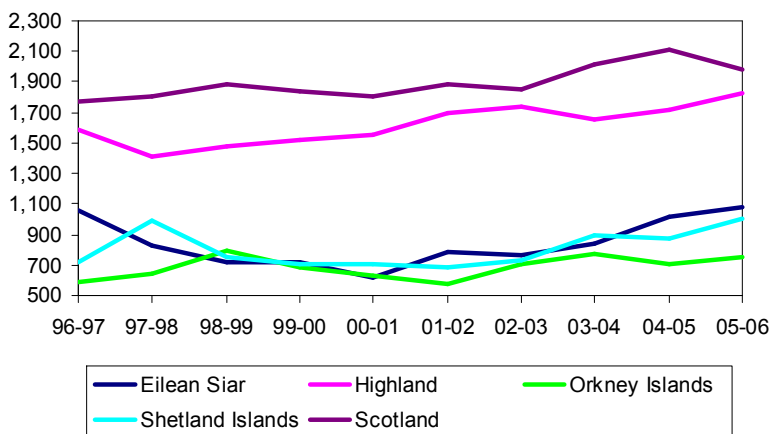

Transport, Travel and Tourism

HIAL Passenger Numbers 2006/07

Recent Highlands & Islands Airport Limited (HIAL) figures show an increase of 7% in passenger numbers over 11 months.

An additional 71,000 passengers have used its 10 airports since April 2006 compared to a year previous. Aircraft movements at the airports have also increased by almost 9%. Increases to the frequency of flights, new routes and the introduction of the Scottish Executive's Air Discount Scheme in May 2006 have all contributed to passenger growth across the region's air network.
