Population and Migration

Small Area Population Estimates

The mid 2008 population estimates were released by the [General Register Office for Scotland](#) in September 2009. The adjacent table shows the percentage population change in ascending order from 2001 to 2008.

The three datazones with the highest estimated percentage population decrease from **2007 to 2008** were:

Newton to Plasterfield	-6.9
Springfield	-5.8
North Manor Park	-5.1

The three datazones with the highest estimated percentage population increase from **2007 to 2008** were:

Newmarket	6.4
Habost to Port of Ness	5.7
Galson to Swainbost	5.0

Life Expectancy at Birth

The Registrar General for Scotland published a report on [life expectancy](#) on 24 September 2009. Life expectancy has improved over the last ten years, both within Scotland and the Outer Hebrides, but still remains poor in comparison to other European countries. Life expectancy for men in the Outer Hebrides is 73.5 years, ranked 28. Ten years ago men in the Outer Hebrides were ranked 29. In contrast life expectancy for women is 81.4 years, ranked 7. Ten years ago women in the Outer Hebrides were ranked 15. Life expectancy at age 65 is 16.3 for males, rank 21 and 20.1 for women, rank 5.

Did You Know? Census of Scotland 1881

The ninth decennial census of Scotland was taken on 3 April 1881. An additional question relating to language spoken was asked; though it was not explicitly mentioned in the Act. It would seem to have been an afterthought, added to the householders' schedule after printing, as it was printed in red in a fold on the schedule. This question read: "In column 6 (headed "Where Born") the word "GAELIC" to be added opposite the name of each person who speaks Gaelic habitually".

Of the 36 datazone areas 11 show an increase while 25 areas show a decrease. The total number of children is estimated to have fallen by 430 since 2001.

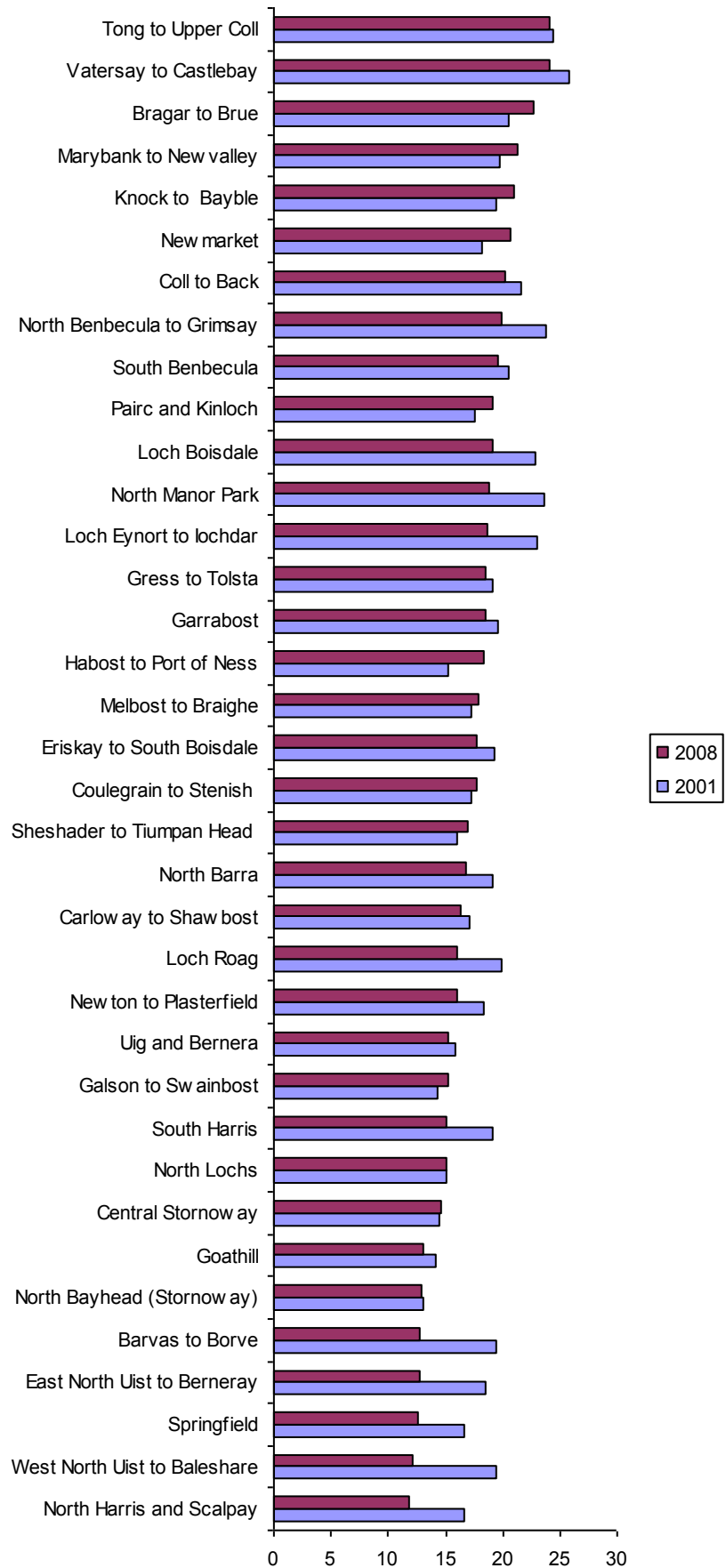

% Children (0-15) in Datazone Areas 2001 & 2008

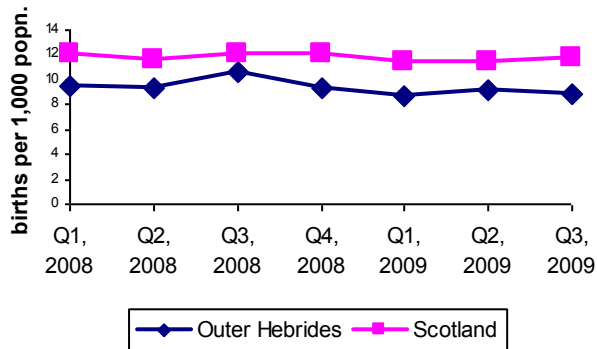

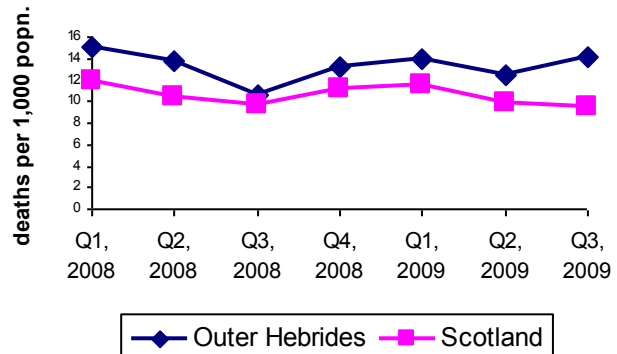
As seen in the graph below the Outer Hebrides has followed the Scottish trend of a lower birth rate in 2009 than in 2008. The Outer Hebrides had the lowest birth rate in Scotland for the 3rd quarter. The birth rate for Scotland was 11.7 in comparison to 8.9 for the Outer Hebrides.

As seen in the graph below the Outer Hebrides has followed the Scottish trend of a lower death rate in 2009 than in 2008 apart from in the 3rd quarter (14.1) where it is significantly higher than in the 3rd quarter of 2008 (10.6). The Outer Hebrides had the highest death rate in Scotland for both the 2nd and 3rd quarter of 2009.

Marriages

In the Outer Hebrides there were a total of 97 marriages in the first 3 quarters of 2008 in comparison to 91 marriages (plus 1 civil partnership) in the first 3 quarters of 2009. In percentage terms there was a drop of 12.5% (7) in the 3rd quarter of 2009 in comparison to the 3rd quarter of 2008. In Scotland there was a 5.4% (645) drop in marriages.

SIMD 2009

On Thursday 29th October Scottish Index of Multiple Deprivation (SIMD) 2009 statistics were published. The SIMD identifies small area concentrations of multiple deprivation across all of Scotland which allows effective targeting of policies and funding. It is based on 38 indicators in the seven individual domains of Income, Employment, Housing, Health, Education, Geographic Access to Services and Crime. As in 2004 and 2006 the Outer Hebrides do not have any datazones in the 15% most deprived datazones in Scotland. This does not mean there is no deprivation in the Outer Hebrides, just that there are no concentrations of multiple deprivation as defined by the index.

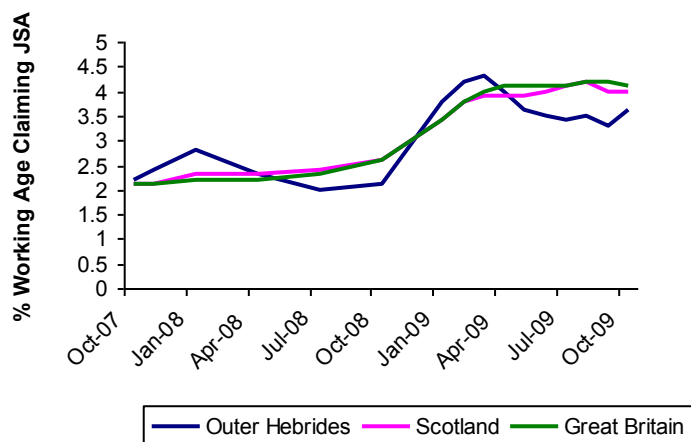
Labour Market

The latest release from [NOMIS](#) (Office for National Statistics) gives the following unemployment rates for October 2009:

Outer Hebrides	3.6%
Scotland	4.0%
Great Britain	4.1%

The unemployment rate has risen to 3.6% from 3.3% in September. The Outer Hebrides has had a lower unemployment rate than Scotland and Great Britain since May 2009. It reached its highest level this year at 4.3% in March 2009.
