
### **Small Area Population Estimates**

Mid 2007 population <u>Estimates</u> at small area level (data zones) have been released. The results in the adjacent table show the percentage population change from 2001 to 2007.

#### **Birth Rate**

The General Register Office for Scotland <u>Vital Events</u> releases figures for births and deaths. As seen in the table below the trend for the Western Isles continues to follow the Scottish trend but is below national average.






#### **Death Rate**

### **Population Projections**

The General Register Office for Scotland (2006 based) gives a projected decline of -5.5% over the period 2006-2031 with: a 25.5% decline in the 0-15 yr age group; an 11.5% decline in the working age population and a 24.3% increase in those of pensionable age. In the Western Isles the projected population decline is due to more deaths than births despite positive net in-migration over the period. A 38% decline in the number of annual births is projected from 250 in 2006/07 to 154 in 2030/31. The 2006 based projections predict a less severe decline in the population of the Western Isles than was previously forecasted in the 2002 (-17%) & 2004 (-15%) based projections.

#### **Household Estimates**

The current Household Estimates (2007) assumptions for the Western Isles identify an increase of 109 households (0.9%) since 2006; this is inline with the national trend (1%).

Of all Scottish Local Authorities, the Western Isles is estimated to have; the highest % of detached dwellings at 64% (nat avg. 20%): the lowest % of occupied dwellings at 87% (nat avg. 96%); the highest % of vacant dwellings at 7.1% (nat avg. 2.8%); the second highest % of holiday homes at 6.2% of all dwellings (Argyll and Bute highest at 8.2%; nat avg. 1.4%); and the lowest % of dwellings with occupied exemptions at 0.6% (nat avg. 2.5%).

### **Household Projections**

The Household Projections 2006 identify a projected 14% increase in the number of households in the Western Isles from 11,600 in 2006 to 13,230 in 2031. This is represents a significant increase on previous Household Projections (2004 based), which forecasted a 1% increase between 2004 and 2024.

Changes in household type between 2006 and 2031 are projected to occur as follows: a 53% decrease in family households containing 'two or more adults plus one or more children' (along with Shetland this represents the largest decrease in Scotland); a 43% increase in 'one adult' households; a 20% increase in 'two or more adult' households; and a 26% increase in 'one adult plus one or more children' households.

#### **Unemployment Rate**

The latest release from NOMIS (Office for Statistics) gives the unemployment rates for October 2008:

the adjacent graph indicates, unemployment rate fell to 2.0% in July, August and September, the lowest rate since records began.


### **Annual Survey of Hours and Earnings (ASHE)**

### **Life Expectancy**

Figures released by the General Register for Scotland show that the <u>Life expectancy</u> for males is below the national average at 72.9 years (2005-2007), a ranking of 28 out of all 32 Scottish Local Authority areas, while for females it is higher at 80.2% (2005-2007), a ranking of 18. Scottish men and women have among the lowest expectation of life at birth in the EU. The countries with lower life expectancy than Scotland were most of the Eastern European states which joined the EU on 1 May 2004 and 1 January 2007.

### Transport, Travel and Tourism

The <u>Road Equivalent Tariff</u> pilot scheme has been introduced. The scheme will operate from October 2008 until the spring of 2011. The scheme cuts the cost of ferry journeys to and from the Western Isles. The routes chosen for the trials are Stornoway to Ullapool; the triangular route between Uig on Skye, Tarbert on Harris and Lochmaddy in North Uist; and the routes linking Oban, South Uist, Coll, Barra and Tiree.

### **Natural Environment**

### **Native Woodland Restoration Survey Report**

The Western Isles Native Woodland Restoration Survey Report was published in 2008. The survey and report production was undertaken during 2007. The survey provides baseline information for future actions and to identify key areas for protection and expansion. A list of 50 sites has been prioritised for more detailed survey. Fourteen key sites within these core areas are described in detail in the report along with recommendations for regeneration and enhancement.



### Focus:

### Census Rehearsal 2009

The <u>Census Rehearsal</u> will bring around 20 temporary jobs to Lewis and Harris as the area takes part in the census rehearsal in March 2009. The rehearsal, on 29 March 2009, aims to test the arrangements for Scotland's next census set for 27 March 2011. It will offer householders the option to complete questionnaires online for the first time, and the online questionnaire can be completed in Gaelic or in English.

#### Census 2011

Scotland's largest population count, the <u>2011 Census</u>, is set to be held in three years time on Sunday 27 March 2011 – the earliest date since 1801. This allows the Census to take place before the Easter holidays and before Scottish Parliament election campaigning. The census is planned to take place on the same day throughout the UK.
